Key Stage Two SATs English



Monday 9 May -

English grammar, punctuation and spelling paper 1: 45 minutes (50 marks)
Spelling paper 2 (20 spellings)

Tuesday 10 May -

English reading 60 minutes to read and answer questions based on a fiction text, non-fiction text and a poem/another text (50 marks)

Wednesday 11 May - Arithmetic Paper 1: 30 minutes (40 marks)

Teacher judgement based on independent writing across a range of subjects



Key Stage Two SATs Tests Explained



Scaled Scores

- •All test outcomes will be reported as scaled scores.
- •The national standard will be 100.
- •Raw scores (the number of marks awarded for each subject) will be translated to scaled scores (a comparable score for each subject) using a conversion table.
- Pupils will receive a raw score, a scaled score and confirmation of attainment of the national standard.
- •There is no correlation between previous levels and this method of reporting using a national standard.

Multiple choice or other selected responses: 10% - 30%

Short responses: 40% - 60%

Extended responses: 20% - 40%

Key Stage Two SATs Grammar, Punctuation and Spelling Test



- There is a greater focus on knowing and applying grammatical terminology with the full range of punctuation tested.
- Technical terms in grammar will be tested.
- In the grammar test, two thirds of the marks will be for multiple choice questions. The remaining questions will require pupils to write a longer answer.

Mathematical Reasoning Papers


- There will be two mathematical reasoning papers.





Key Stage Two SATs Test Week Arrangements



- Children to arrive at school by 8.00am
- Breakfast provided for children in the classroom
- A restful weekend and plenty of sleep!
- All tests will be taken in the morning.
- All writing equipment and maths tools will be provided.



Key Stage Two SATs How can you help?



- Help children not to feel worried or pressured about SATS. All that is asked is that they try their best, but please reassure children that the SATS should not be causing anxiety. Do give lots of praise and encouragement!
- Please ensure that your child is in school every day during SATs week.
- Ensure that they are in school on time
- If your child is ill, let us know immediately.



Key Stage Two SATs Secondary Schools



- As well as your child's SATs results, secondary schools also require teacher assessment.
- Teacher assessment draws together everything the teacher or teachers know about a child, including observations, marked work and school assessments.
- Teacher assessment is not a 'snapshot' like tests and is therefore more reliable.
- There can be a difference between teacher assessment results and test levels.



Key Stage Two SATs



- Listen to what we say;
- We are both cheering you on and want you to do your best;
- Make sure you get plenty of sleep and stay well fed sleep and
- food help keep the brain moving;
- Read the questions carefully. This can help to avoid any silly
- mistakes!
- Don't worry if there's something you can't answer. Take a deep breath! You can always move on and go back later but it's better to write something rather than nothing;
- Keep in mind year 6 SATs are just one week of your entire life!
